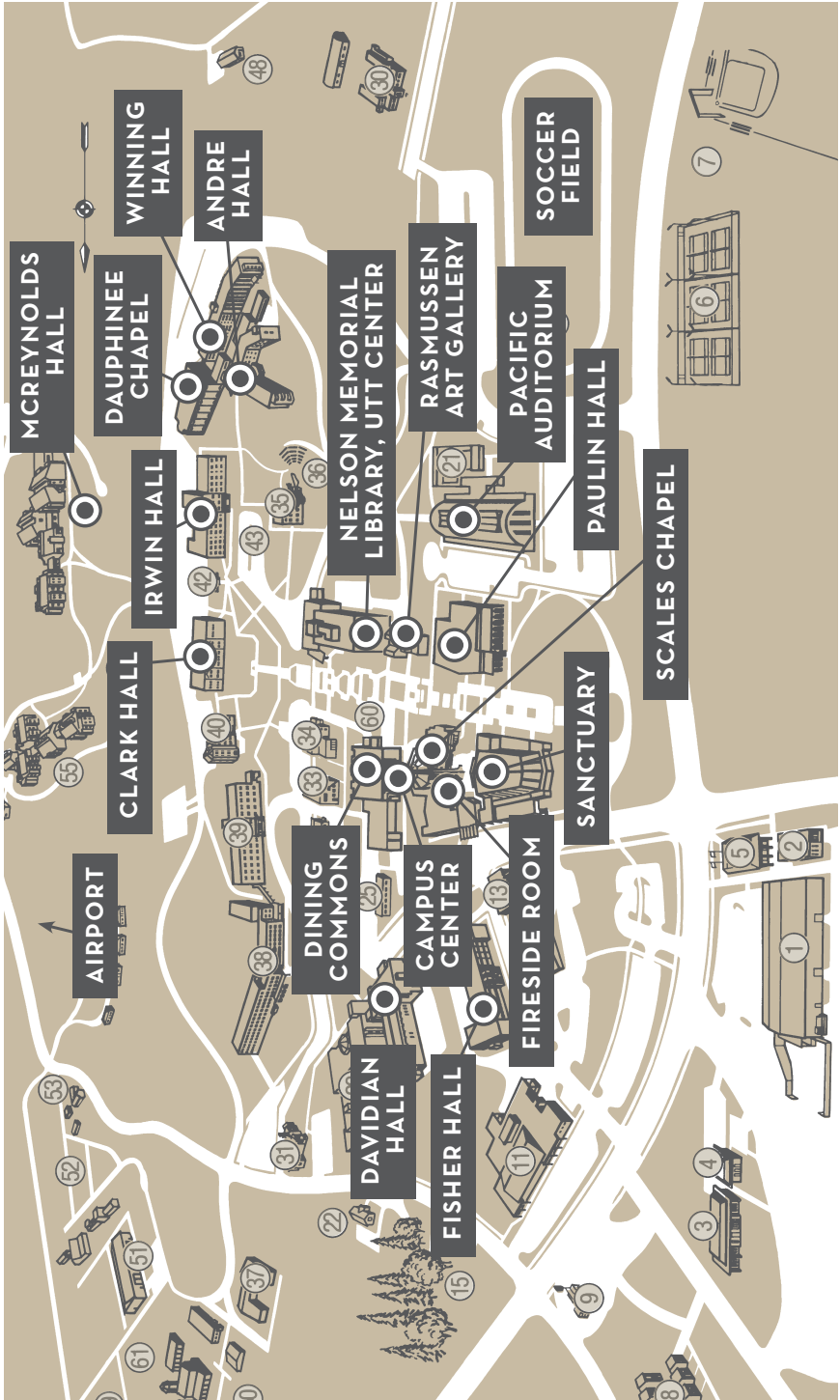
Because you are here, I know PUC still holds a special place in your heart.

GUEST SPEAKERS & HONOREES

George R. Knight, '65 Speaker



George R. Knight, class of '65, has served the church as a university professor, pastor, school administrator, and an elementary and secondary teacher. His last

assignment was at Andrews University, where he taught for 30 years.

George is an avid student of both the Bible and Adventist history. He has written over 50 books and edited another 45 in Adventist history, biblical studies, Ellen White studies, theology, and the philosophy of education. Some of his recent titles have been *Educating for Eternity: A Seventh-day Adventist Philosophy of Education*; *Adventist Authority Wars, Ordination, and the Roman Catholic Temptation*; and *Prophets in Conflict: Issues in Authority*.

George has written widely for over four decades on the historical development of Adventist theology. His most recent title in that field is *End-time Events and the Last Generation: The Explosive 1950s*. In 2018, he was the Walter Utt Visiting Scholar at PUC. His Utt lecture was expanded and published as *Ellen White's Afterlife: Delightful Fictions, Troubling Facts, and Enlightening Research*.

George and his wife Bonnie, class of '74, live in a wooded valley in southern Oregon and enjoy outdoor activities, gardening, and spending time with their children and grandchildren.

She began full-time ministry as the associate pastor for youth, young adults, and worship ministries at Bonita Valley SDA Church in San Diego. Then, she earned her Master of Divinity degree at Andrews University. Afterward, Samantha served as the children and family pastor at Azure Hills Church before becoming the elementary chaplain at Loma Linda Academy for over 600 students from TK-6th grade.

Samantha is married to fellow pastor Wally Peralta, and together they have two beautiful children, Olivia and Orion. She recently completed her Doctor of Ministry degree at Fuller Theological Seminary, emphasizing family discipleship.

In her free time, Samantha enjoys reading, exploring the Marvel Universe, experimenting with new recipes, and hanging out with her family and little dog, Shiloh.

Bruce Anderson, '60

2025 Honored Alumni

Bruce Nils Anderson's connection to PUC spans generations. His great-grandfather, Charles C. Lewis, joined



the PUC faculty in 1910, and his grandmother, Agnes Lewis, was PUC's first graduate in 1912. His parents, Charles and Elizabeth Anderson, were

also PUC graduates, making Bruce a fourth-generation PUCite.

Bruce graduated from PUC Preparatory School in 1957 and earned a BA in History from PUC in 1960, studying under professor Walter C. Utt. While Bruce's academic accomplishments are many, his greatest joy at PUC was meeting and marrying Audrey Amelia Thompson.

Bruce is a psychiatrist trained at Loma Linda University, Stanford University, Harding Hospital, and Ohio State University. He served as Squadron Surgeon for the First Cavalry Squadron at Ft. Hood, Texas, and maintained a medical practice in Hinsdale, Illinois.

In 1978, Bruce and Audrey moved to Angwin, where Bruce remained on the St. Helena Hospital medical staff until 2024 and served as chief-of-staff twice. He has been a member of Adventist Health, Clearlake's medical staff, for 15 years and chaired the Adventist Health California Medical Group board from 2001 to 2023.

Bruce has held leadership roles in the PUC community, including head elder of the PUC Church, president

of the Alumni Association, and college board member. He co-founded the Walter C. Utt Endowment and played a key role in supporting PUC's library and faculty. Bruce and Audrey have three children and five grandchildren, with two children following in their parents' footsteps as PUC history graduates.

Andy Bishop, '10 **2025 Honored Alumni**

Andy Bishop's life was defined by a constant love for sports and people. He played basketball, baseball, and football from a young age, excelling



in each. Andy even led his intramural football team to

a championship victory at PUC—equivalent to a Super Bowl win on campus! His sports pursuits were vast, including wakeboarding, surfing, snowboarding, and golfing, and he excelled in them all.

Andy's dream of becoming a sports broadcaster started early. As a child, he absorbed the rhythms of sports radio on his way to school. At age 11, he got his first taste of broadcasting at a fan-fest booth during the Super Bowl in San Diego. That moment sealed his fate. He pursued his passion at PUC, majoring in communication and business, before continuing his education at San Diego State's Sports Management program.

After graduating, Andy began broadcasting high school football games and created his own sports

website and podcast, "Best Coast Sports Connection." His dedication turned his passion into a career. But Andy's heart extended beyond sports—he loved serving others. He volunteered with Big Brothers, participated in mission trips, and coached high school basketball.

Tragically, Andy was killed while training for a marathon in September 2021. His energy, enthusiasm, and legacy live on through the Andy Bishop Scholarship, supporting PUC students who share his passion for sports, broadcasting, and community service.

Dale Galusha, '82 **2025 Honored Alumni**

Dale Galusha, a local Calistoga native, is a PUC graduate with deep roots in the Adventist community. Born at the "Sanitarium," Dale grew up with his siblings, all PUC alumni. He came to PUC in 1976 after attending Foothills Elementary and Rio Lindo Academy.



His college years included a two-year break, serving as a taskforce dean at Indiana Academy and working in food service at Platte Valley Academy

in Nebraska. Anyone who has tasted his legendary cinnamon rolls knows that food service was a formative experience for Dale.

His ministry calling emerged early, and after PUC, he served in various roles, including Assistant Pastor/Youth Pastor at Lodi English

Oaks Church, Associate Pastor at Chico SDA, and Pastor at Fairfield Community SDA Church. Dale also worked as a conference evangelist for the Northern California Conference. Currently, he is the longest-serving president of Pacific Press, leading the church's influential publishing work.

Dale is known for his ability to connect with others, his authenticity, and his passion for gospel music, especially Adventist artists. His role at Pacific Press includes overseeing Chapel Music, where he has befriended many of his musical heroes.

With a remarkable knowledge of the Adventist Hymnal, Dale's love for music is evident, and his ministry continues to inspire and impact lives. Today, we honor Dale for his dedicated service to the church and PUC.

Duane Wall, '69 **2025 Honored Alumni**



Duane Wall, born in 1947 in St. Helena, grew up on Wall Road and attended local schools, including St. Helena Public Elementary, Lodi Academy, and Rio Lindo Academy. He later enrolled at PUC, where he was actively involved in campus life, editing the Associated Press news, broadcasting at KANG radio, and writing for the Napa Register. During summers, he worked in logging and helped build the church. He graduated in 1969 with degrees in Rhetoric and Public Address.

Drafted into the Army in 1969, Duane served as a field medic with the 101st Airborne Division in Vietnam, assisting in surgeries at the 85th Evacuation Hospital. After his service, he worked in hospital administration, met his wife Roberta, and later ventured into insurance and co-owned Barrel Builders. In 1987, he co-founded Tonnellerie Francaise French Cooperage of America, the first company to manufacture American Oak barrels in the French style, allowing Duane to travel worldwide.

An active member of the Napa Valley community, Duane has served on various boards, including the Napa County Grand Jury, and helped rewrite the Napa County General Plan. He and his sister Alice established the Wall Family Endowed Scholarship Fund at PUC in 1998, supporting students.

Duane enjoys fly fishing in Montana and spending time at his home there. Humble about his accomplishments, Duane credits his blessings to God's grace and peace. We are proud to recognize him as an honored alumnus.

Justin Wilson, '03 **2025 Honored Alumni**



Justin Wilson, a native of Alabama, was raised in a family that valued service, entrepreneurship, and the arts. He developed a love for music early on, learning to play the piano, violin, and trombone, alongside an interest in math and technology. Justin earned degrees in Electronics

Engineering and Music Performance from PUC in 2003.

After college, Justin worked as an electrical engineer at Raytheon Technologies, earning him the “with Honors” distinction and a senior position. Despite his success in aerospace, his passion for music remained strong, leading him to form the choral group Wilson and Co. and release the album A Wilson and Co. Christmas in 2011.

Justin furthered his music education with a master’s certification in Orchestration and Film Scoring from Berklee College of Music. He arranged and scored music for film and TV, including an appearance in the HBO film All the Way. In collaboration with Randy Waldman, he co-arranged the Grammy-nominated album Superheroes, which earned Justin a Grammy Award for Best Arrangement of Instruments and Vocals in 2019.

In addition to his music career, Justin has dedicated himself to church ministry for over 20 years. He and his wife Shelana have two children, Justin II and Shia. As a family, they formed Wilson World Media, which has gained millions of followers and worked with major brands like Google, Apple, and Amazon. Justin’s greatest pride, however, is being a father. He is honored to be recognized as an alum by PUC for his exceptional contributions to music and ministry.

Jay & Karen (Ericson) Lewis, '96 2025 Honored Pioneers



Jay and Karen Lewis have been integral to the PUC community for nearly four decades. Jay, born in Arkansas, and

Karen, born in South Dakota, met while attending Union College. Jay earned degrees in sociology and history while Karen pursued nursing.

His career began in the prison system before returning to Union College, where he helped establish a social work program. Later, Jay helped establish the sociology department at Atlantic Union College. In 1986, he joined PUC’s social work department, where he would become a beloved faculty member.

Jay and Karen have been deeply involved in the Angwin and PUC church communities, always opening their hearts and home to those in need. They have hosted individuals during holidays, provided temporary housing for newcomers, and supported anyone in need.

His leadership extended to serving as board chair at PUC Prep and staying active in the local Kiwanis chapter. Jay and Karen have volunteered at the Angwin Thrift Store, benefiting underserved community members. Karen has been a nurse for decades, serving in student health services and working with St. Helena Hospital’s home health and hospice departments.

In retirement, Jay & Karen continue contributing and working on a committee to establish a senior center in Angwin.

Their lasting legacy of service to Adventist education, PUC, and the community is a testament to their unwavering commitment. We are proud to honor Jay and Karen Lewis as pioneers of our community.

Meg & Manny Scrofani **2025 Honored Pioneers**

Meg and Manny Scrofani are educators with over 83 years of combined experience in teaching, administration, and education policy. Throughout their careers, they have held roles as teachers, administrators,



superintendents, principals, professors, and California state directors of education, impacting countless students and educators across the state.

Active members of the PUC community since the early 1990s,

Meg and Manny's journeys to Napa Valley began on opposite coasts. Meg, originally from Baltimore and raised in Missouri, moved to Southern California and later attended college at Berkeley. Manny, the son of Sicilian immigrants, was born in New Jersey and spent his early life there. They both began their teaching careers in different states before eventually crossing paths at the California State Department of Education in the late 1970s. They were married in 1984.

Together, they played pivotal roles in securing funding for educational programs and technology, ensuring resources for underserved communities, and creating guides and training for school board members statewide. Their efforts influenced thousands across California's 1,000+ school districts.

In 1990, Meg and Manny moved to Napa Valley and became instrumental in connecting PUC to the wider community. They organized teacher events on campus and created opportunities for PUC students to engage in local service projects, cementing their legacy as committed and generous contributors to education in the Napa Valley.
