SPEAKERS



Tammy McGuire has served as a professor in Pacific Union College's Communication Department for the last 18 years. She teaches a wide range of courses, including Communication Research, Health Communication, Persuasion, Small Group and Interpersonal Communication. Dr. McGuire spent several years as an English teacher at Upper Columbia Academy in Washington state before earning her Ph.D. in Communication from the University of Missouri-Columbia. She has received the Zapara Excellence in Teaching award and was honored as PUC's Educator-of-the-Year in 2011. As a Colorado native, Dr. McGuire has a deeply ingrained love for the outdoors. She can often be spotted happily riding her mountain bike in the wilds of the desert southwest, PUC's "Back Forty," or wherever adventure calls.



In his almost 40 years of service to the Seventh-day Adventist church, Mark Witas has been a dormitory dean, Bible teacher, college professor, youth pastor, academy chaplain, and senior pastor. Pastor Witas is currently the Director of Mission and Spiritual Care for Adventist Health Glendale, where he works with 15 chaplains, staff, and administration to bring spiritual and emotional care to patients and staff. He has published four books and numerous articles. Pastor Witas is married to Wendy and is the father of his favorite son, Cole. Today is a homecoming for Pastor Witas, who returns to PUC after pastoring this church for several years.



TADELE (TAD) WORKU is a Family Nurse Practitioner, an educator, a musician, and most recently, a mission coach at Inland Empire Health Plan. Worku has won a range of awards, including the Vanderbilt Outstanding Family Nurse Practitioner Student of the Year and Loma Linda University Health Emergency Nurse of the Year. In 2012, Worku was set to embark on an international tour and release his debut pop album, for which he received a grant. Instead, he chose to cancel his tour, return his funding, and step away from music entirely in search of a more profound calling. That decision led Worku into emergency nursing at a level-one trauma center in Southern California. He credits his six years as an ER nurse as the foundation of the music he began to write to process his experiences as a clinician. In 2020, Worku reunited with his award-winning team of musicians to step back into the music world and release his debut album. Worku uses his stories and experiences in healthcare to create new music that inspires hope in listeners.



Roy Ice is the Speaker/Director for Faith For Today and the host of the #1 life coaching series on broadcast television, Lifestyle. Ice has explored the rain forests of Panama, Australia, and Costa Rica, and plunged into the freezing waters of Finland. He received multiple awards as a professional drummer and has coached Olympic Gold Medalists from various countries. Some of his favorite years were spent as PUC's Chaplain from 2005-2011. Ice has authored several books, including 12 Things to Try While You're Still Mortal, which climbed to the #1 bestseller spot on Amazon Kindle Books in 2015. His greatest joy comes from helping people get unstuck and on their way to fulfilling their greatest life purpose. Ice and his wife, Dyna, have enjoyed 23 years of marriage and have two teenage boys who keep them active and laughing.

SIGNIFICANCE OF THE ACADEMIC BANNERS

The eight banners used in the graduation procession and displayed during the ceremony represent the college seal and the seven areas of study that are part of the college's legacy of academic offerings. Each banner incorporates either the torch or the book—elements of PUC's college seal. The colors and other symbols employed in each banner represent the academic fields.

- ~ APPLIED ARTS: Symbols—Torch and Symbol for Constructing Colors—Maroon, Orange, and Green
- FINE ARTS: Symbols—Torch and Spiral (symbolizing the golden mean)
 Colors—Gold Yellow, Crimson, and White
- ~ Humanities: Symbols—Book and Quill Pen Colors—Light Blue and Citron
- ~ NATURAL SCIENCES: Symbols—Book and Symbol for the Four Elements
 Colors—Green and Gold Yellow
- ~ Professional Studies: Symbols—Torch and Scroll Colors—Burnished Gold, Silver Gray, and Apricot
- ~ Religion: Symbols—Cross and Book Colors—Scarlet and Purple
- ~ Social Sciences: Symbols—Torch and Globe Colors—Citron and Sage Green

SIGNIFICANCE OF ACADEMIC REGALIA

Caps and gowns worn in formal academic convocations in American colleges and universities are the descendants of the everyday attire worn in the universities of medieval Europe.

Three basic types of gowns are worn: bachelor's gowns have long, pointed sleeves; master's gowns have long, closed sleeves; and doctorate gowns have full sleeves with velvet bars. The bars may be black to indicate any doctoral degree, or the color of the particular degree, e.g. dark blue for doctors of philosophy.

The part of the regalia that tells the most about the degree is the hood. Hoods for master's degrees are lined with satin in the colors of the academic institution conferring the degree. The edging or trim of the hood is a wide velvet band, the color of which indicates the academic area in which the degree is earned. The wide, velvet edging of the doctoral hood indicates the particular kind of degree held, e.g., dark blue for Ph.D., light blue for Ed.D., and green for M.D.. The length of the hood reflects the level of the degree represented.

Some universities include stoles specific to their university. PUC graduates have the option of adding the college's stole or stoles representing their cultural heritage, status as a first-generation college graduate, or status in the US military to their regalia. PUC's stole is green with the college's seal in gold. Graduates who have participated in the Adventist Colleges Abroad and World Missions programs wear white and light gray stoles respectively with the flag of each country in which they studied or served, while members of the National Society of Leadership & Success may wear platinum stoles with black embroidery.

The mortarboard or beret is worn with all degrees. The tassel should be black or the color appropriate to the subject, with the exception of the doctor's cap that may have a tassel of gold.

- ~ Certified Nurse Educators or Clinical Nurse Educators wear red or red and white cords.

SIGNIFICANCE OF THE NURSING PIN

Florence Nightingale is the first nurse known to have been presented with a professional nursing pin, awarded by Queen Victoria for her outstanding patient care to soldiers during the Crimean War.

The Associate of Science graduates' pin is in the form of a Greek cross, which has become a symbol of unselfish nursing service given with professional knowledge and skill. The lamp in the center of the pin symbolizes the relief of suffering by nurses who give love, caring, and healing.

The Bachelor of Science graduates' pin has three circles surrounded by a laurel wreath. Within the inner circle is a flaming torch denoting Christ as the light of the world, and an open book which represents the book of life and the wisdom of the scriptures. The next circle contains the motto of the college, "They shall be all taught of God," and the outer circle identifies the college name, Pacific Union College. The wreath signifies the achievement of the victors of the baccalaureate nursing program.

SEATING

ABOUT MAXWELL COMMONS

D. Malcolm Maxwell was the nineteenth president of PUC and the first alumnus to serve in that role. He had the longest tenure—18 years—of any president of the college. Maxwell passed away in 2007, but his legacy and the impact he has had on PUC continue to live on. He is remembered for his energy, passion, and commitment to higher education, and it is in this spirit Maxwell Commons was named.

THE HISTORY OF THROWING TORTILLAS

The tradition of throwing tortillas at graduation began in the mid- to late-90s during Pacific Union College's graduation in Commencement Grove. Beach balls and confetti poppers were a time-honored tradition, but then tortilla tossing was introduced. Due to its novelty, it quickly gained popularity, and slowly the other traditions (i.e., beach balls and poppers) faded.

The tortilla-throwing tradition possibly began at Bay to Breakers, the annual footrace in San Francisco. No one really knows when it started, but for decades now, thousands of people have gathered at the starting line and tossed tortillas in the air before the official race begins.

EDUCATOR OF THE YEAR


